Traffic and Speeding Update

Staffordshire County Council have been unable to provide a solution, that is satisfactory to residents, in order to reduce traffic speeding on the A522 through Beamhurst. The Parish Council have therefore taken the case a step further and provided Kate Kniveton MP with a folder of all communications between Parish Council, Residents and Staffordshire County Council regarding this problem. She has forwarded this directly to the Department of Transport Policy Team for their attention and the Parish Council awaits a response, which hopefully will be reported in the May 2024 meeting.

In responding to residents' ongoing concerns about speeding on our narrow roads, the Parish Council has experienced extreme difficulty in getting reduced speed limits imposed locally. The Parish Council used its powers to request that Staffordshire Parish Councils Association (SPCA) liaise with National Association of Local Councils (NALC) to approach Central Government and SPCA have agreed at their Executive Meeting held on 11th March 2024 to take this motion forward to NALC. The motion is below:

"Croxden Parish Council has a number of roads within its rural parish that have a speed limit that are set by law at the National Speed Limit due to country roads automatically being set nationally at the National Speed Limit. Croxden Parish Council residents have for a number of years been asking for some of the roads within the parish to be reduced to 40mph from 60mph and the County Council unfortunately do not have the funds as such a request needs to go to the Secretary of State in Central Government. Therefore, Croxden Parish Council would like SPCA to accept this motion and to work with NALC, in order that NALC can lobby the Government for a national change to be made to speed limits on rural roads. Rural roads are the most dangerous in the UK, accounting for nearly two thirds (60%) of all road deaths (RAC). With most country roads, even those with no central marking carrying the national speed limit of 60 mph there is a real temptation for motorists to drive at the limit because they are technically allowed to do so, even if it is inappropriate because of the driving conditions or local hazards.

Not only are too many lives are being lost on these roads, but damage is caused to roadsides and verges, pollution levels are increased and the speed of drivers acts as a major deterrent for other users of the system such as walkers, cyclists and horse riders. We believe the time has come where strategic, rather than tactical action needs to be taken.

The current position of requesting county councils to implement a change in speed limit has significant costs financially, plus in time and effort and generally is not progressed until death or serious injury has occurred.

We believe that this needs to change as a matter of urgency. Our suggestion would be to make a simple change to the national speed limit, reducing it to 40mph for carriageway roads without central line marking.

This approach has the following advantages: It could be implemented nationally with a simple administrative change by Government. A single national information campaign could be cost effectively run to communicate the benefits of the change to all road users no changes to signage would be required.

Croxden Parish Council would ask SPCA to consider the motion to request NALC to pursue this national change of speed limits with Central Government."
